Pastor's Corner

As our new month kicks off with Palm Sunday, Holy Week, Easter and the following Easter-tide season, we get to prepare ourselves for all that the season brings. An end to our Lenten journey in the wilderness, and the heavy hitting season of yellow pollen coating everything begins. The snow (which we haven't had *knock on wood*) melts to reveals new birth of flowers and wildlife, and a time in which all of us are able to enjoy the outdoors again without layers and layers of clothes keeping uswarm, as shown by *The Christmas Story* pictured



The seasons changing always brings joys and challenges, it is the duality of the world that we live in, and that way of being seems to be apart of everything that surrounds us. I recently finished reading the book titled *Mythos* by Stephen Fry. It is the re-telling of the Greek myths that have been infused throughout our society, language, and almost all that makes up our artistic culture. The myths highlight the way in which humans see the world as something that is made up of many mysteries, and hard to explain experiences in nature. One of the ways they explained the changing of winter to spring is that the goddess Persephone, who is the daughter of the goddess Demeter (she controls all the growth of vegetation on earth), returns from the underworld where she spends 6 months of the year with Hades. Persephone's return cause Demeter great joy, and thus the world is thrown into celebration via new growth and flowering. Persephone and Hades are two of the main characters in the Broadway musical Hadestown, where the seasons changing plays a pivotal role in the narrative. (I highly suggest seeing this musical if you get a chance!)

While we do not worship the gods of ancient Greece, we can find ourselves in the stories that the ancient Greeks' used throughout their society. The celebration of spring warrants myths and festivals as we leave the cold and cyclical death of fall and winter behind us for another year. There are festivals throughout the world that celebrate this time of year. A few of my favorite would have to be Cooper's Hill Cheese-Rolling and Wake, where participants race down a steep hill -- known as Cooper's Hill, near Gloucester, England -- as they vie for the day's ultimate prize: a round of Double Gloucester cheese; and the Songkran, known as the Water Festival by visitors, this annual festival in Thailand falls shortly after the spring equinox and acts as the traditional New Year's Day. Along with visiting elders and going to a Buddhist monastery, festivities include throwing of water – which means it is basically a nationwide water gun fight.

And we, as a church, celebrate the resurrection of our savior Jesus Christ. Many times we focus our attention on the cross and the fact that Christ died, yet that is only half of our story. For if all we had was a great teacher and prophet who died upon a cross, I dare to say, we would not have a Christian religion. The fact that Christ was taken down from the cross, placed in a sealed tomb, and by the power of God was released from death's grasp is

where our joy, hope, and faith is able to lay. Spring, Holy Week, and especially Easter day, serves as a reminder that while the cross may stand at the front of our sanctuary and is a major symbol for our faith, it is only a representation of half our reason to celebrate. As spring brings new life, as it brings forth resurrection, we celebrate with the faith that our savior lives, and that we get to move from the cross to the new life, just as the seasons move.
