THE PASTORS CORNER

Hymns have been an integral part of the worship of God since the very beginning. The psalms are one of the earliest forms of these hymns, and from early on in my faith journey, I learned about hymns and the role that they played in our congregational worship. My grandmother, Kirk, taught piano and sang in the church choir throughout her life and that love of music was passed on to me. Often times, prior to her passing, I would call or message her to ask about what hymns would fit with a scripture passage or the overarching theme of my sermon. She'd always give me a few options, and I always loved that they were traditional hymns like 'Great is Thy Faithfulness'. She taught me about the power of music and lyrics in a hymn had to inspire people in worship.

The singing of psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs is a vital and ancient form of prayer. Singing engages the whole person and helps to unite the body of Christ in common worship – Book of Order, W- 2.0202 Prayerful Participation.

We each have connections to different hymns that move and inspire us. No matter the hymn being sung, it allows us to join with each other as a congregation, and with the greater church universal as others sing hymns alongside of us. It is one of the greatest unifiers in all forms of worship, and we at MPC are blessed to enjoy many great hymns played and sung in our congregation.

One of the things that I have learned recently is to appreciate newer hymns and Christian music. I confess that I am not the biggest fan of the Christian music that is on the radio. However, while I do not seek it out, I recently have come to a different perspective about the newer, praise band style of worship music from a young couple I was talking with. They were (and perhaps still are) church hunting and being able to relate to what was happening in the service was of utmost importance to them. They related through music. One of the main things they liked about the more 'modern' (I use that term loosely here) church services, is that the songs sung could be heard on the radio as they drove around. I had not thought about that connection before and it has changed my outlook a bit as it relates to praise band music and the songs heard on Christian radio stations (I am still not a big fan of the music though, so oh well). But this connection brings the church out of the walls of the sanctuary and into their everyday lives. It is a reminder of their faith and dedication to God throughout all aspects of their life. On their way to work, to the grocery store, to the doctor's office, to visit family, they can hear the songs from church on the radio. This can help them frame their life with Christ.

I use the example of my grandmother and the young couple to highlight the different ways we all approach worship and the music that is sung before, during and after our hour together on Sunday mornings. There is beauty in the diversity of worship music that represents the diversity of experiences in our lives. Different hymns talk about the different ways that God supports humanity, the different ways we interact with God, and the different ways we grow in our faith. We can be inspired by these songs to grow in our faith and encounter God in new ways. Even in death there are hymns that unite us and remind us of our faith. One such hymn for my family is Faith of our Fathers (which cannot be found in the Presbyterian hymnal unfortunately). We sing this at every family member's funeral, and it is a hymn that reminds everyone of our loved one's dedication to their faith in God and how we too can move forward through a difficult time of loss. It is unifying in its communal act of singing and in its reaffirmation that our faith is passed from generation to generation.

We experience new life each and every day and our faith changes as life progresses. Our worship reflects that we both honor our traditions and open ourselves up to the new ways that the Holy Spirit inspires us. The Presbyterian Handbook offers a final tidbit in regard to singing hymns that I wish to leave you with. "Hymns are often sung in such a serious way that the congregation forgets to enjoy the music. Sing with energy and feeling." Our journey of faith is a song, an ever-evolving tune that rings with the echoes of the past and the dreams of the future. Therefore, I invite you to sing each hymn with passion as they inspire us time and time again, and with the knowledge that as we join together as the church universal, we celebrate the grace that sustains us and the hope that drives us forward. The LORD has always asked that you make a joyful noise, not always a beautiful one !!




To the Mitchells Family:
