Spotlight on: Mitchells Presbyterian Church with Rev. Kerry

Kerry here, writing about my time at Mitchells Presbyterian Church. If you are not familiar with Mitchells, Virginia, it is east of Culpeper. If you are not familiar with Culpeper, then it is time for some day trips around the presbytery!

Mitchells' building stands in the midst of farm country, looking as if it were placed there on purpose (of course it was!). I was driving on a narrow country road at the time, so I thought it was best not to try to snap a photo! I do have other photos!!

The building presents itself visually as a wonderful country church, sidewalk to the front door, trees in the front yard, a cemetery to the left, and parking to the right. When you see the fellowship hall, it is a bit more modern-looking but fits in well with the original structure. Stepping inside, the narthex matches the building perfectly.

Step into the sanctuary, and the view changes. Stone walls and chandeliers, deep colors in the carpet and woodwork; relief work in the ceiling; stained-glass windows on the side. I considered going outside to see if I had been in the wrong building, but it was indeed the right place! More affirmation came from those coming to worship and those milling about the fellowship hall. Simple hospitality! I have come to expect hospitality wherever in the James that I find myself, and it is always there.

Their pastor had prepared a wonderfully detailed outline for the service scripted for all participants. I believe he thinks, as I do, that we are called to prepare our lay leaders to handle an entire worship service, almost making the pastor "unnecessary!" I know this is not so, but I do know that they have a good and trusting pastor, one who cares for them even when he is not with them.

The service is recorded and goes out on social media. The lay leaders and the choir are full participants in the service, which must be a blessing to all who are present either in person or from a distance. Their choir was great to hear, but the choir member did say to me, quietly, "Keep an eye on those three (men) in the back row!" I was not sure what I was in for, but I did notice them being rowdy in the hallway! However, they were perfect angels in the choir.

Following worship was a time for fellowship and snacks. For me, it was a time to meet more of the Mitchells' family and just enjoy the day. Like all of the churches I have visited in the past, I am hopeful to be back, just as a "guest," and see Mitchells from the pews.

I am thankful for this Sunday to be with a sister church and siblings in Christ. May God continue to minister to Mitchells and through Mitchells, as God has done yesterday, today, and tomorrow.



The Story of Ian and Beti Turner

How can one describe a couple like Ian and Beti? She is a darling and he a daredevil—or perhaps he is the darling and she the daredevil. Their personalities are so intertwined that it is difficult to assign these roles definitively to just one or the other.

Ian was born in Stony Stratford, a town outside London, England. His father's military career saw him posted to Cyprus in the Middle East, where he received an education at The American Academy, Larnaca, Cyprus, an elite Presbyterian Missionary School. This environment exposed him to multiple languages, including Greek, Turkish, and Armenian, broadening his perspective and shaping his character. Beti, on the other hand, was born in Wales and, after moving to England, attended the village school where her father was the headmaster. Even as a child, Beti was driven by a desire to become an architect, revealing her ambition and creativity from an early age.

After World War II many people relocated to newly built communities outside London. Beti took on a role as a kindergarten teacher and moved into a new apartment complex. It was there that she met lan, who had also recently moved in. Their connection was immediate, and just a few months after meeting, they were married and began their journey together.

lan and Beti embraced life wholeheartedly, often taking risks and pursuing their interests with enthusiasm. Ian, while dedicating up to six hours a day practicing classical guitar, earned a degree in theoretical physics. He held as many as 25 patents related to computer hard drives. Beti continued teaching kindergarten but expanded her expertise over time to include computer science, photography, and design projects. Their approach to life was marked by doing everything in excess and constantly seeking new adventures.



The couple came of age during the 1970s, a period characterized by young couples moving beyond traditional domestic roles. Ian and Beti shared a passion for British theater acting and became deeply involved in British rally racing, becoming sponsored by The Allard Motor Company. Beti distinguished herself as one of the few female codrivers among international competitors. Parenthood, (the couple have two daughters,) encouraged an end to their involvement in rally racing.

lan's position at Xerox Research UK brought them to the United States. His American high school diploma proved valuable for his work in the country. Ian and Beti eventually moved with their two daughters to sunny California. Throughout these transitions, they remained committed to raising their daughters and enjoying leisure time aboard their boat, Turn-Style—a playful nod to their family name, Turner, and their sense of style.

After 20 years of this lifestyle, they adopted a baby son, and, soon afterwards, transitioned to New England. There they maintained a home and employment for the next 20 years, with Beti doing website design, and Ian becoming involved in secretive technical research.

As they contemplated retirement, a colleague suggested the charming town of Culpeper, Virginia. After relocating, lan and Beti visited a different church each Sunday until they settled at Culpeper Presbyterian. Eventually, they found their way to our family at Mitchells Presbyterian Church. Recently, lan and Beti downsized to their retirement home, where they now enjoy a gentle, domesticated life. Together, they cherish a wealth of remarkable journeys and memories from their adventurous years.


