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Pastor's Corner

When October rolls around and neighborhoods fill with pumpkins, costumes, and the playful excitement of children, many Christians wonder: What do we do with Halloween? For some, the holiday feels suspicious, too tied to the eerie or the unknown or even satanic practices. For others, it's simply a lighthearted time for candy, laughter, and community. But what if, instead of seeing Halloween as a point of conflict, we as Christians could see it as an opportunity to live out their faith in harmony with the season?

To begin with, the roots of Halloween are more connected to Christian tradition than many realize. The very word "Halloween" comes from "All Hallows' Eve," the night before All Saints' Day. All Saints Day has been celebrated for centuries, as the Church sets aside November 1 to remember those faithful men and women who lived before us. October 31, then, is the evening of preparation—a time of watchfulness and reflection. While cultural practices around this night have changed over the years, the Christian foundation should remain as Halloween is not something "outside" of our faith but historically tied to it.

Father Michael Bruno, dean and professor of church history, observes that "All Hallows Eve, All Saints Day, and All Souls Day form the brief season of All-hallow-tide...their traditions serve as a reminder of personal mortality and the importance of spiritual vigilance...remembering the saints is important also for our own spiritual life. We are not doing this alone, but ultimately, we're accompanied by the Church, both here on Earth and in heaven."

Even the themes often associated with Halloween, such as death, darkness, and mystery, have a place in Christian thought. The gospel itself proclaims light breaking into darkness, life overcoming death, and hope transforming our fears. So perhaps when we see skeletons, tombstones, or spooky imagery in the coming spooky season, we can be reminded of Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 15: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." For Christ has triumphed where fear once held sway.

On a more personal and practical level, Halloween can be one of the best days of the year for building connections with our neighbors. Rarely do we have another time when people walk from door to door, smiling, laughing, and knocking just to say hello. It is a unique chance for us as Christians to embody hospitality! A warm welcome at the door, a kind word, even a cup of hot cider offered to weary parents; and in a fragmented world, Halloween can create a moment of community, without suspicion or division.

So instead of framing Halloween as a battle between faith and culture, we as followers of Christ

can see it as a shared story that allows participation in deep rooted traditions of remembering the saints, acknowledging life's mysteries, and celebrating community. And at its most practical, it offers a golden opportunity for front-porch hospitality. So as we go into the month of October (Spooky-Season) Christians and Halloween need not be at odds. For the holiday can become a space where joy, hope, and light shine all the brighter, reminding us that wherever we go, and in whatever season we find ourselves in Christ goes with us.
















The Culpeper Baptist Church 2025 Concert Series. All concerts are free and take place in the church sanctuary.
